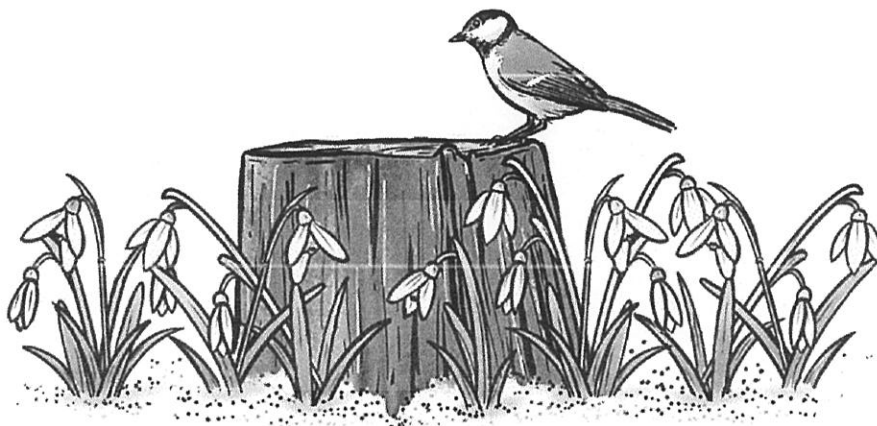

FROM THE MINISTER:



Dear Friends

With the coming of a new year, my thoughts have very much focused on the immense pressures our system of care is under, especially the NHS and Social care.

In Matthew 25 Jesus says, in essence, when we help, when we look after, when we care for others, we are caring in God's name. On the other hand, if we ignore, walk by on the other side, look after only ourselves We, as Christians, are neglecting in God's name.

I have for a long time been the advocate of a system where all social care is brought in under the umbrella of an NHS that does a holistic approach.

In that way there are resources and planning in place which does away with the current system. A system which is a postcode lottery of local government resources and means a constant battle with so many hospital beds tied up with those who should not be in hospital but for whom there is no safe place to go.

This is not politics, this is not partisanship, this IS the simple right for folk, especially the vulnerable, to be treated with care and dignity.

The Archbishop's Commission on social care, just published, makes hard but essential reading on this matter. It avoids wisely on how any new system is to be funded. If we are to be a caring and loving society then surely if that means paying more tax, we should do just that.

So many crying out that 'something must be done'. For Christians the message is clear and unequivocal – again I refer to Matthew Chapter 25. If we do it the least of these brothers of mine....

The need for reform, and love, and proper care is there. The time to act, is now, before society really hangs its head in shame.

Advance Booking, as with the evening Quizzes, is essential.

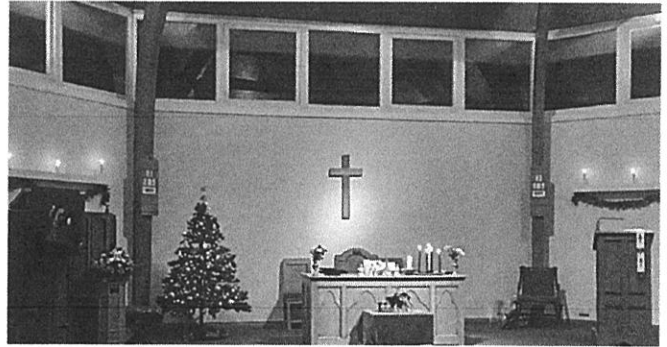

When Eve was about to give up hope that the cold winters would never end, an angel appeared. She transformed some of the snowflakes into snowdrop flowers, proving that winters do eventually give way to the spring.

PUSSY WILLOW

The First Flowers of Spring



At the tail end of winter, fuzzy nubs start to appear along the branches of pussy willow trees. These soft silver tufts—as well as the plant itself—are named for their resemblance to tiny cats' paws, and they feel so much like fur that young children often wonder if they are animals instead of plants.

Another legend: kittens of a mother cat fell into the river. As they floated off, the cat ran along the bank mewing so plaintively that the willow trees bending over the water took pity and leaned their branches low, so that the kittens could climb to safety. Ever since, we have had these beautiful pussy willows every spring. Just a story - but the soft grey buds do feel very like a cat's fur.

The buds are actually flowers just before they fully bloom. The soft coating of hairs acts as insulation to protect these early bloomers from cold temperatures. As the season progresses, the female flowers develop into tiny seedpods, while the male flowers turn into fluffy clusters of pollen. Later in the season, the willow's leaves will emerge, and the plant will be covered in a sea of green.

TERRA-CYCLE UPDATE -SPRING 2023

Please do not put dirty or sticky items in the boxes, and empty crumbs to avoid mess on the carpet

Remember that anything you can recycle at home is not suitable – please put in your recycle bins at home.

Soft plastic bags are also not suitable – please take to your supermarket.

Lent

**begins on Wednesday 22nd February
and ends on Thursday 6th April**

The day before Lent starts, we have Shrove Tuesday - 21st February ie Pancake Day.

The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting.

On this day, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven', or absolved from their sins, which gives us *Shrove* Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this. For the next 47 days, they pretty well starved themselves.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession.

Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron, and still holding the pan.

Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: eggs stand for creation, flour is the staff of life, while salt keeps things wholesome, and milk stands for purity.

Shrove Tuesday is always 47 days before Easter Sunday.



The word Lent traces back to an old Germanic word for 'long'. Originally Lent was a time of discipline to prepare for Easter, dedicated to reflection and repentance. It is a time of giving things up – one way of remembering the time Jesus fasted in the desert and is a test of self-discipline. Some of us just give up something they really enjoy, such as cakes or chocolate. And make a donation of what we would have spent.

However, we could consider 'Taking Up' instead.

There are many things we could do – for example:

- Contribute more to a food bank.
(There is a great need at the moment).
- Donate small amounts to a different charity each week – charities are now struggling.
- Write a letter to friends and family.
- Phone instead of texting.

(These last two would mean so much to some people).

With the above in mind, OCCC always contribute to WaterAid during Lent. The Coin Jars will soon re-appear!

Each time we have a drink, made with clean water, think of the countries where water is not available. So, at our coffee sessions, please donate your small change. This soon mounts up, and by Easter there is always a good amount to send. (I arrange this for us).

We will have seen the heart-rending television items, of children spending most of their time walking in the heat to collect water, which is dirty and germ-laden. WaterAid specialise in digging wells for villages, and clean plentiful water results. Therefore everyone is healthy, and the children are able to go to school.

We say ‘Amen’ – almost automatically - at the end of our prayers. The use of "amen" has been generally adopted in our worship as a concluding word and as an expression of strong agreement.

The basic meaning of the Semitic root from which it is derived is “firm,” “fixed,” or “sure,” and the related Hebrew verb also means “to be reliable” and “to be trusted.” The Greek Old Testament usually translates amen as “so be it”; in the English Bible it has frequently been rendered as “verily,” or “truly.”

ST SIGFRID, APOSTLE OF SWEDEN

If you have something big to forgive, Sigfrid may be the saint for you. This monk from Glastonbury was sent by King Ethelred to Norway and Sweden in 995. The King of Norway, King Olaf, had recently converted to Christianity, and wanted help in converting his people.

Sigfrid went first to Vaxjo in Sweden, taking along his three nephews. There he built a small church, commissioned it, and consecrated his nephews as bishops. Then Sigfrid left them, in order to evangelise the more remote regions.

So far so good, but when Sigfrid returned, he found the church had been burned to the ground and his nephews murdered. The attackers had been caught, and the king was about to put them to death. It would be an act of justice.

Instead, Sigfrid pleaded with the king for mercy. It was agreed that a large fine should be paid to Sigfrid. He did not keep a penny for himself, but used it to rebuild the church, and continue the mission. Sigfrid went on to minister in Sweden, Norway and Denmark for many years, until his death in 1045.

He was remembered with love and credited with many miracles.

# **WORDSEARCH NOTES**

## **The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/Candlemas**

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2 February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'.

Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.



So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40.

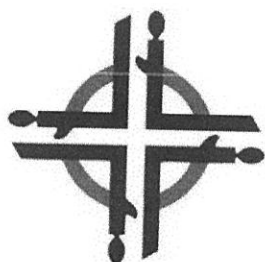

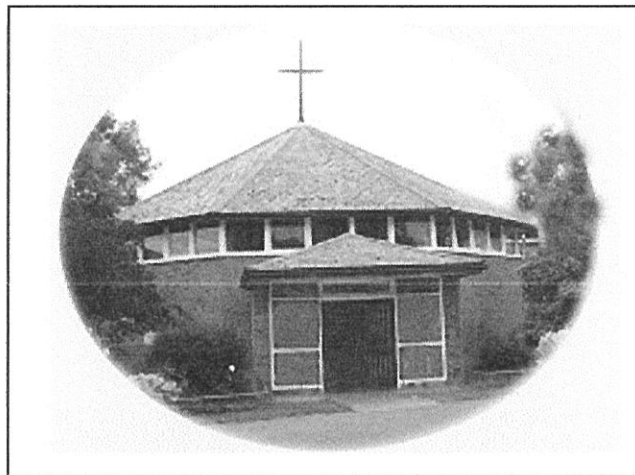
