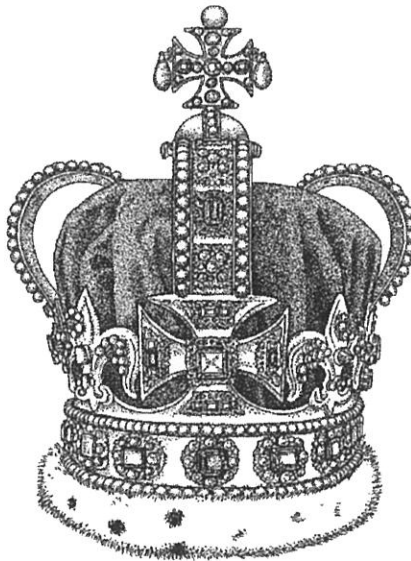

Dear Friends

May this year encompasses not only the festival of Pentecost and Christian Aid Week but of course, on May 6th, HM King Charles III is crowned at Westminster Abbey, the first coronation ceremony for 70 years.

As this country and indeed the commonwealth and world adjust to this momentous change, we are reminded of the same life/world changing moment when, in Act Chapter 2, we read of the ‘tongues of fire’, the ‘rushing wind’, the very presence of God empowering the Disciples with the Holy Spirit. This act is the catalyst that will give birth to the Church and usher in an ongoing discipleship and work that has lasted 2,000 years.

May God give us all the strength to continue His work on earth, to renew ourselves each Pentecost -and then give us eternal rest in his presence.

# THE CORONATION OF KING CHARLES III

On 6<sup>th</sup> May His Majesty King Charles III will be crowned, and then in a similar but simpler ceremony at the same service, Queen Camilla will also be crowned.

The Coronation is based on a solemn religious ceremony which has remained largely unchanged for more than 1000 years. For the past 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, and is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Everlasting God, we pray for our new King. Bless his reign and the life of our nation. Help us to work together so that truth and justice, harmony and fairness flourish among us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

The last Coronation was that of Queen Elizabeth II – an amazing 70 years ago, in June 1953!

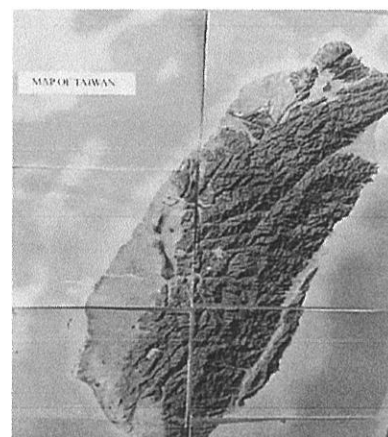
## **WORLD DAY OF PRAYER – 3<sup>rd</sup> MARCH 2023**

This year's service took place at Coulsdon Methodist Church, and was prepared by the WDP Committee of Taiwan.

Taiwan has for many years been caught in a superpower struggle against China. The service offered prayers and encouragement for women who face suffering and injustice. Since the 16<sup>th</sup> century Taiwan has also been colonised by different foreign forces and the people have experienced conflict.

Our Anthea Fox and Vivian Job took part in the service. During the singing of first hymn five women walked towards the Taiwan map, each carrying a piece of the puzzle to complete the map.



The service was based on prayers from women of the country, asking for strength and wisdom to cope with an uncertain future. “I have heard about your faith”.

The service was most enjoyable and very well attended.



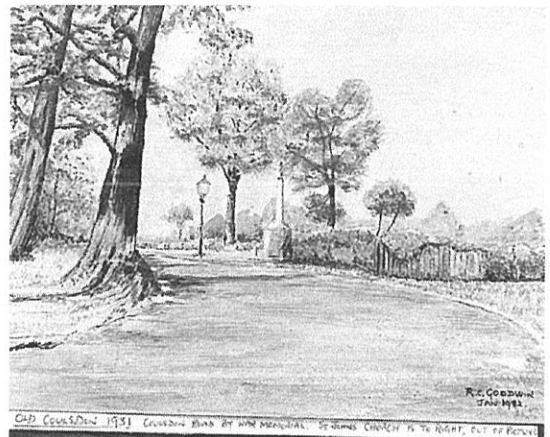
## **ART EXHIBITION SATURDAY 11<sup>th</sup> MARCH**

## **LEPROSY MISSION TALK AND UPDATE**

On March 26<sup>th</sup>, we were very pleased to welcome Ian and Pauline Jepps again of The Leprosy Mission. We were given an interesting update of the TLM work, and also some new information.



The new laboratory at Anandaban, Nepal is progressing well. Emphasis these days is on education and rehabilitation – we heard the story of Shakti, who had to have her lower leg amputated, but now has a new prosthetic limb, and can continue studying. Also, Nagajo, who has become an electrician.

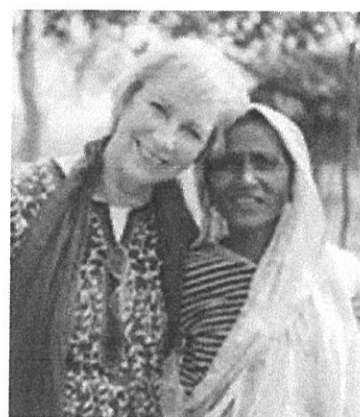
The stigma does remain, but an understanding is becoming known, that people have been cured.



Another source of employment is the tea gardens of Bangladesh. The rich green tea leaves are handpicked, mainly by women. This is Aloka, whose leprosy was cured, so she can continue to work and support her family. Sadly, if leprosy is untreated, their hands may become useless, and the income is lost. TLM does a great deal to prevent deterioration.

Pam Rhodes, Songs of Praise presenter, is the TLM Vice President. She visited the tea gardens, and saw the beautiful foliage being carefully collected.

Pam has done so much to raise awareness of this work.

On Easter Saturday I took my scooter to the end of Happy Valley in Chaldon Way.

I was then able to walk along Happy Valley for the first time in many months. I can no longer manage the steep slope to the valley, as my knees are now too stiff and painful.



As I entered the valley, in the first yards I could see many clumps of beautiful fresh primroses in bloom. A promise of spring really on the way.

I joined the old familiar path through the woods which led me to see if the “old log” – now approaching 60 years of useful service - had decayed. I was amused to see that the small tree growing up behind the log has reached out a limb to embrace it, as though it would help it to stay together!

My old friend the chestnut tree still stands firmly on her steep bank and had clearly had a good crop of chestnuts (conkers) last autumn. I picked up one which had put out a small root and have planted it in a vain half-hope it may grow a tree for me!!

My second walk, maybe 9-10 days later, was simply along the top of the valley. I was delighted to see how spring had advanced since my Easter walk. The blackthorn was just breaking into its lovely white blossom and the old wild cherry trees were covered in beautiful pink blooms. A hawthorn had its early leaves and flower buds.

Towards the end of my trail I saw a spread of just opening cowslips and violets still in great abundance and a few primroses too.

Up the difficult steep steps and into the woods that led back home. At the very entry on to the path I spied a wood anemone in beautiful full flowering. As I stepped up the first yards of the path I was bemused to find on all sides blue bells in bloom. It seems too early! It was however wonderful to see them spreading throughout the woods, escorting me home.

I feel I had been given a glimpse of life starting up again!

Ascension Day – 18th May

Ascension Day is the 40th day after Easter Sunday - and always falls on a Thursday. It marks the last appearance of Jesus to the disciples after his resurrection at Easter.



Jesus had spoken to his disciples about what was going to happen to them and what he expected them to do. He was with them on the Mount of Olives when 'a cloud hid him from their sight' (Acts 1.9) and 'he left them and was taken up into heaven.

(Luke 24.51).

This is the last time the Bible records the risen Jesus being seen. The story of Jesus' ascension in the Acts of the Apostles tells of two angels appearing to his followers and telling them that Jesus will return one day.

## Pentecost – 28<sup>th</sup> May



Ten days after the Ascension (and fifty days after the resurrection), the Holy Spirit, in form of flames, came to the followers of Jesus – as recorded in the New Testament. Jesus had told them to wait until the Spirit came to them. The message He had given them was "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you".

And then, on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues – to the astonishment of those who heard them. Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning, and 3,000 people were converted.

This is Pentecost - recognised as the birth of the Christian Church - celebrated on 28<sup>th</sup> May this year.

## Facts about King Charles

He was born at 9.14pm on 14<sup>th</sup> November 1948 at Buckingham Palace.

He has been heir-apparent to the throne since he was three years old.

He is the first monarch in British history to have earned a university degree.

He can speak Welsh.

He is a qualified pilot and diver.

He is a keen watercolour painter, a published author and played the cello at Cambridge.

As Prince of Wales, he founded about 20 charities which raise about £140million each year for good causes.

Aged 73, King Charles III is the oldest monarch ever to be crowned in British history.

He became King on 8<sup>th</sup> September 2022, after the death of his mother, the Queen, in Balmoral.

As King, he is also now head of the Commonwealth.

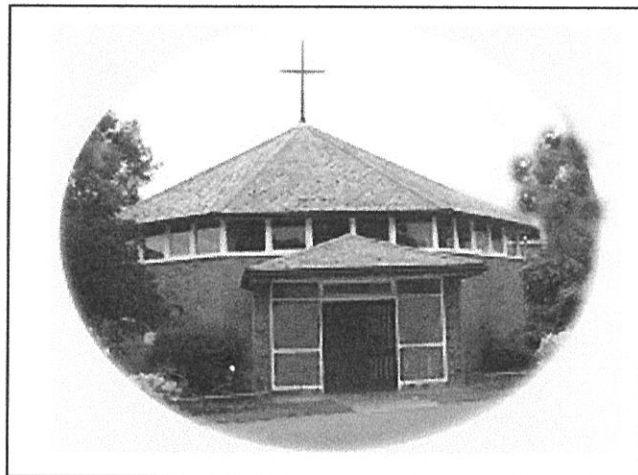
