Dear Friends

When I was inducted as your Minister in January 2001 [delayed because of the terrible fire], I remember saying that my Ministry would be, at least in part, focused on what I call “The 4 E’s”:

I have been coming to the church for an amazing 70 years!! The church of course is the people, not the building, and I began as a child in the Sunday School, held in the old Purley Boys' School. We were saving for the new church even then, and collected £30. A lot of money for children to donate in those days. It was spent on the lectern that Malcolm uses every Sunday – there is a small plaque at the foot – do have a look.

WITH OUR SUMMER HEATWAVES in mind, in times gone by, in warmer countries, there was a tradition to insert cobbles with dips in them at intervals along roads and pathways.

The dips gathered the rain or morning dew and provided a cooling drink for birds or the street animals. People might step over the concave cobbles, not even noticing they were there.

RE-CYCLING – NATURE'S WAY!

With our Tetracycling in mind (next Sat 9th September), here are some observations made by a small girl.

She had been told that the previous year there had been a wasps' nest in her garden hut. Of course, the wasps had left, never to return. She learned that the wasps gathered the material for the nest by biting little bits of fences, decking and whatever wood they could find, and mulching it up.

One day though, her mother was delighted when she came home from school and said she had been given a sticker to put on the class's 'well-done' chart.

"What did you do to win it" asked her mother. "I was kind to someone" she replied.

Apparently one of her classmates had been in tears in the playground. Joanne had gone across to comfort her, and a teacher noticed her response.

Winning a medal for kindness is worth a lot.

THE PERFECT PRAYER

Thank you for the world so sweet,
Thank you for the food we eat,

In her teens, Edith Leatham (1870-1933) used to write verses for Christmas cards. The family had little money to spare, and what she earned was a godsend. One day Edith was asked to put a poem to a picture of a child with its mother, head bowed and hands folded. She wrote three simple verses, and was paid five shillings.

Forty years later she read four lines in a newspaper – by then nobody knew who had written them. But Edith recognised them as her own work, one verse of that poem she wrote so long ago.

Before her death in 1933, she had seen the verses travel the world as perhaps the most perfect prayer for children that has ever been written.

The first two lines are often swapped round, making it a prayer of grace before meals.

I remember singing this in my days at the Sunday School in Purley Boys'. (It only appears in the very old little red hymn book Sunday School Praise, number 56).

“MARY HAD A LITTLE LAMB” is a rhyme known to children everywhere, but have you ever wondered who Mary was?

Mary’s father was a shepherd in the Welsh hills and often came home after a stormy night with weak or sick lambs to be looked after. His daughter Mary would take them until they were able to look after themselves. Two of these lambs were her special pets, and she named them Billy and Nell.



Soon they were following her everywhere, watching her from the farm gate every morning as she left for school, and waiting when she came home. Once, Billy managed to escape, and to the teacher’s dismay he turned up in the classroom.

This story became known throughout Llangollen, and a few years later a visitor from London heard all about it from Mary herself. That visitor, Jane Buell, wrote stories and rhymes for children – and before long, she’d turned Billy’s escapade into five short verses.

Today its one of the best-known nursery rhymes in the world. When Mary was an old lady of 87, she confessed that to hear her story on the lips of so many children was one of the great joys of her life.

But the farmer warned her not to make pets of them – when they had recovered, it was time for them to join the other lambs in the field.




